MA Overview

A Medical Assistant, or a Clinical
Assistant, is responsible for assisting
Doctors and Nurses in providing care to
their patients. Their duties include
recording and updating medical
histories and contact information in
patient files, scheduling patient
appointments and performing standard
care procedures like drawing blood,
checking vitals or collecting lab samples.
For many of our providers here at
HOPES, their MAs are important partners
in patient's health care.

Our medical assistants are responsible for all of the vaccines that come in and go out of this clinic. This includes over 40 vaccine types, such as all childhood vaccines, flu shots, COVID vaccines, shingles, tetanus and others!

Here at Northern Nevada HOPES we currently have 35 MAs, 2 of which are Community Health Workers, who assist with our population health program and our diabetes management classes for our patients.

The average age of a medical assistant

The Bureau of Labor Statistics states that employment for medical assistants is projected to grow 23 percent from 2014 to 2024. the growth rate for all occupations is 5 percent.

About 123,000 openings for medical assistants are projected each year, on average, over the decade. Many of those openings are expected to result from the need to replace workers who transfer to different occupations or exit the labor force, such as to retire.
